Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program

The Vance County Cooperative Extension Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) associate & 4-H agent joined the students in Ms. Yarborough's Foods II class at Vance County High School. The first week in February sixty students created smoothies after learning about Smart Snacks in the Fuel for Life high school curriculum. Beginning the second week in February students created Chicken Club Salad for the Fuel with a Purpose lesson.

EFNEP is for limited resource youth and families with children. EFNEP is based on the latest research in nutrition and physical activity. EFNEP is conducted by trained nutrition educators. EFNEP addresses overweight and obesity by helping families to prepare and eat more meals at home. EFNEP can benefit your community, provide encouragement for positive behavior changes and connect families to additional community resources.



Chicken Club Salad

Ingredients:

- 1 cup pasta (uncooked whole wheat, small, such as macaroni or rotelle)
- 6 cups Romaine lettuce (well washed and torn, or spinach)
- 2 cups green peppers, fresh, chopped (or choose a combination of bell peppers, celery, cauliflower florets, cucumber, carrots*)
- 2 cups tomatoes (chopped)
- 1 1/2 cups cubed cooked skinless chicken (1/2 pound skinless, boneless chicken)
- 1/2 cup Italian dressing
- 1 egg (hard cooked, optional)
- 1/4 cup cheese (shredded, or cheese crumbles)

Directions:

- 1. Wash hands with soap and water.
- 2. Cook pasta according to package directions; drain and cool.
- 3. Place 1 1/2 cups of the Romaine lettuce in each of 4 large bowls or plates.
- 4. Combine chopped vegetables, chicken, and pasta.
- 5. Add dressing; toss lightly to coat. Divide evenly among the 4 bowls.
- 6. Top each serving with a few egg slices, if desired, and 1 tablespoon of the shredded cheese.

When our children are born, no one gives us education or certifications, they just say, "Here you go, and good luck".

Unfortunately, good intentions and love aren't enough to ensure your child reaches their full potential. They also need role models, praise, and positive parenting.

In many professions, you need a four-year or advanced degree to qualify for the position. To legally drive a car or to get married you must get a license, to show that you qualify. So why do we not need some form of training when we have children?


